Please call, write or e-mail the Council and the Mayor with your concerns.



Bridge Traffic

As related at the September PPCC meeting, the city has been tracking the number of vehicles crossing the lift bridge this year. Below are the monthly figures, January through August. You might note that the highest traffic month, July, is more than twice the traffic seen in the slowest month of February. If traffic trends continue, by the end of the year we will see nearly **Two Million** vehicles cross the bridge!

"Meow!, Meow!"




Now is the time – don't just recite words of prayer but rather talk to God as to a friend. Tell God what is on your mind and heart. We have God's promise to listen

Elizabeth Mackay, vice president, called the meeting to order @ 7:00 pm.

Minutes from August, 2010 meeting

Al Robins moved to accept the minutes. Bill Silver moved to second the motion. Carried.

Treasurer's Report by Al Robins

August, 2010 balance was \$56,166 Sept. 1, 2010 balance was \$50,881

Expenses included Joy Fouts (Summer youth program); Carla Tamburro (Art Fair); shed.

Income included rentals of the Park Point Community Center.

Tom Mackay moved to accept the report. Tom Ward seconded the motion.

New Business

Eric Shaffer, city engineering office, spoke at the meeting in regards to street projects & etc. He said the street overlay was delayed 3 weeks due to equipment being used out of town.

No infrastructure will be corrected at this time. Only the overlay. Eric answered questions from members of the club about the project. If you voluntarily want a sewer lateral from the street to your home, two options were given.

- 1. \$3,000 if you voluntarily want the lateral
- 2. \$4,000 if the city requires a lateral to the house.

These options were only available for the next two weeks.

Officer Tinsley said 45 police calls were recorded last month.

Bridge committee Dennis Holscher said during June, July and August, 2010 there

News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden

October will be a busy month for Park Point gardeners. It's time to harvest those last few bits of produce left ripening on the vines. Afterwards, chores will need to be done to prepare our gardens for the winter. Then, we can tend to raking the abundance of leaves that will gather in our yards. The members of the Lafayette Community Edible Garden have great ideas to help celebrate this special time of year and the activities associated with running a garden.

First, to deal with the piles of produce harvested from the garden this fall, we offer our monthly Sunday Potluck Supper on October 17 from 5 to 7 p.m. at Lafayette Community Center. We'll focus on creative squash preparations, but any delicious dish is welcome. Come join the fun – you don't need to be a member of the garden to participate.

Second, during our October 17 Potluck Supper, we'll learn all about ways to prepare our gardens for the winter from Laura and Gerry Sundberg, who have been gardening a half-acre vegetable garden in rural Duluth for 42 years. They will tell us how and when to plant vegetables such as garlic and onions, how to prepare our gardens for the winter months and insure their fertility in the spring, and provide tips on canning and preserving this fall's crops.

Third, when it's time to tackle the leaves piling up in your yard, remember that the community garden accepts bagged leaves for its compost bins. Keep in mind that the leaves must be free of chemicals to ensure we keep our garden organic. You can reuse the large plastic bags that we recycle – there is a basket of them in the garden right by the entrance. Just bring them back filled with compostable material and set them inside the gate. We'll dump them in the compost bins for you.

Not Every idea is the Best idea

On Wednesday Oct. 13 at 4 pm at Central hillside community club the parks and Recreation commission will discuss the proposed campsites at the end of the Point.(you can attend/comment)

a few points in the Sept 8th Task Force Final Report include the following excerpts::

- 1. Create 5-15 sites with up to 6 people per site
- 2. Camping season Mid May to mid October (22 weeks)
- 3. Fires permitted on the sand. Firewood provided with the \$30/night fee
- 4. Composting toilet(\$37,000 plus maintenance costs)
- 5. Managementment/Oversite by volunteers "...interact with campers and make sure all appropriate city ordinances are being followed"

In a telephone conversation with the assistant manager at Tettegouche State Park he did not think that volunteers would work and the level of supervision would be a Building and Grounds Worker (\$12-13/hour). On going training is needed on how to deal with confrontational issues. Campers wander, they use a lot of firewood and when they can access the sites by boat they can bring in a lot of stuff.

While walking around a petition these past two weeks (we have almost 500)these are a few of the concerns that were expressed by the petition signers:

"With the city budget in trouble it's a terrible idea to add this expense"

"If it happens to make any money they'll want to turn it into a campground"

"I'd love to camp there ...not sure about the other guy"

"I can't have a fire in front of my own home and someone can go down near the woods and build one"

"The city has a hard time providing enough toilets and long enough in the park...take care of what we've got"

"More people will be camping everywhere...it's a can of worms"

"Volunteers living on the beach...how long will that last"

"Dry beach grass could easily catch on fire and then the trees are next and it would be indefensible"

The end of the point is now used by people seeking a calm and restorative connection to serene lake views and old growth pine forest. This resource is well used by a lot of people with very little impact on the environment. In planning language this is the highest and best use of this sliver of land. Not every new idea is the best idea. Leave it as it is. If you agree, one thing you can do is go on line.. go to Save Park Point go to the blue box to sign the petition and leave your comments.

Editor's Corner

As usual, there are several things I want to comment on. I'll start with one I've written about before: The proposed hotel near 10th street on the Point. In it's initial incarnation I opposed this, as it called for zoning changes and ran contrary to the city's comprehensive plan. Now, according to that "other" newspaper in town, property owner Joel Johnson has come back with a new plan. The plan as shown wasn't complete, and the details may contain more causes for concern, but my initial reaction was "That's more like it".

The plans showed a waterfront hotel, entirely below Minnesota Avenue, where Lakehead Basin now lies. It doesn't appear to require any zoning changes, and would leave the traditional neighborhood on Lake Avenue South intact. Yes, it would still bring in more traffic, and development of a "Small Area Plan", to better determine was best fits down there, should still be done. But this kind of project would be harder to oppose.

Moving on to the street resurfacing project, we learned a few things at the last PPCC meeting. Specifically, some of what we thought was scary broken sewer pipes were actually accesses that are supposed to be open, so cleaning and inspection equipment can get into the lines. Oh, there's still utility work that should be done, but it's not in quite the dire straits that many of us thought.

Finally, there's the camping on the Point issue. As a kayaker who's camped in a few, shall we say, "undesignated" sites around Lake Superior in my time, maybe I'd better just keep my head down and let other people do the commenting here.
