


Give Witness to Jesus

With sunshine on our shoulders and a good coat of sunscreen, we have become floating caterpillars with our inner tubes and noodles, chased a few run-away beach balls, waded on our knees and found a few buried shoes. Lego Ville has reached its completionawaiting the demolition team so we can re-build. We have worn white frosting mustaches and sang Happy Birthday to ourselves and played hockey with the Mighty Ducks, hoping this would cool us off on the hottest day of the year. We have hooped and hollered at the Library Kids Programs, checked out enough books to open a shop and paid enough over due fines to break the bank.....oops! We have traumatized our neighbors gardens with stray tennis balls and for that we apologize. We have found lost library cards, mystery lunches, misplaced swimsuits and towels in the most interesting places and gone through more Balsa Planes than the flight school participants as the skies have been very turbulent and accuracy is something we have not mastered. We have been silly with Dilly Bars from DQ on hot summer days and wetted our whistle with the cold Water Cooler water. We have jumped through the fountains in Canal Park and walked the Lake Walk. We are forever building towns, cities and water ways on the play ground, putting the PVC pipe to good use. We have done soo much and have soo much left to do, pleaase stop down and join in the fun. Park Point.....naturally

I have yet to talk to someone who has actually seen a water shrew in the waters of our bay, but it's virtually certain this unique little animal lives here....unique because it's the only mammal in the world that can "walk" on the water! Actually, it rapidly skitters across the surface of calm water while using the stiff hairs on its legs and toes to keep from sinking. The fact that even the largest of them weighs less than an ounce helps it stay on the surface.

Our habitat, though now limited, is ideal, especially in places such as Southworth Marsh and the east side of Hearding Island. This shrew emulates the skill of a mink when it spots a minnow. It then dives and swiftly pursues its prey with the chase usually ending successfully for the predator. It also feeds on other small aquatic life. They have silky black fur on the upper parts of their body and silver hair on their under side.

It's quite likely their numbers here were much greater when the bay was populated by floating islands. That environment disappeared when the ship canal was built and the islands escaped into the open water of Lake Superior where storms shattered the floating mats of vegetation.

In my years of wandering in the wilderness I've seen a water shrew only once and that one appeared beneath my feet as I walked on a tiny frozen pond. It moved remarkably fast under the clear ice of the pond. If you should be lucky enough to spot one on the Point, I would like to hear from you.

There's another tiny resident here that you might have seen but didn't realize what you were looking at. Your cat or dog might have brought you what you believed was a chubby little mouse but was, in fact, a southern bog lemming. I know they live in our boggy locations because I saw a mounted specimen in the biology department at UMD and was told it was trapped on the Point. Slightly larger than the water shrew, the lemming is a relative of the suicidal lemmings of Scandinavia but they don't drown themselves when starvation threatens their survival.

The local lemming prefers a bog-like habitat that affords them unlimited amounts of grass. They harvest the long stems and stack them in small piles along the runways they create and line their above or below ground nests with straw. There they produce two or three litters a year.

These little fur balls have ears so tiny they are hidden by their abundant brownish fur. If you find one and aren't hesitant to do so, examine its front feet...you'll know it's a lemming if it has only four toes.


Unless you had a high powered telescope and frequently scanned the water on the lake side, chances are that you didn't see the rarely present red throated loons. Thanks to the persistence of veteran birder Tanya Barcikowski and her "scope" I saw a couple of the several dozen reported at this end of the lake. It's too late to look for them now. After an inordinate length of delay before heading for Arctic breeding grounds, the attractive waterfowl left us. Our native common black and white species will stick around the bay for weeks to come.

One of the two does that have taken up residence on the Point still makes it nightly visit to my neighbor's bird feeder to access the crushed corn by sticking its tongue into the small openings meant only for the birds. It appeared that she was carrying a fawn but haven't heard of anyone seeing the offspring.

Perhaps she hid the little one on the western tip of Hearding Island as I watched (and video taped) her as she beat the heat wave by taking a neck-deep swim off the sandbar.





Dear Mayor Ness,

Not all residents of Park Point, where I have lived for 66 years, are against Joel Johnson's hotel and the boost it will give Duluth's economy, increase employment and the tax base. At Joel Johnson's presentation months ago at our Park Point Community Club there was a large majority in favor of Joel's plan to build a hotel with a convenience store. It seems the only people who get press on this matter are some residents who live near the Marina who have been very vocal and act like they are the voice of Park Point. We never see these people at Community Club meetings because most of them have not joined the Community Club. (Dues are a whopping \$3 per person). There is even a facebook site, "Save Park Point," that was initiated by somebody who lives out of town but owns property down here. People move down here and right away they don't want anything to change now that they are living here. Many of us have lived down here a long time. My family moved to Park Point in 1918. We respect Joel, his late father Clarence "Johnnie" Johnson, and his family, and everything they have done for the residents on Park Point in the past. We just want you to know there is another side to the coin.

By the way - We realize neither you or any of our councilors attend our Park Point Community Club meetings and never get a feel for what the whole community wants or needs. We are a very diverse community with many diverse opinions on any subject regarding the Point. As an old Park Pointer once said - "If you can find any two people on the Point who can agree on the same subject at the same time, you've really got something".

Black Helicopters?

Representatives of Superior Helicopters attended the July Community Club meeting. These are the guys offering helicopter rides at Sky Harbor Airport. They explained their efforts to minimize noise and disturbance over Park Point, such as operating above 1000 feet - except when taking off and landing, of course. And flying a pattern that takes them over the bay, (normally downwind of Park Point), and over industrial areas. One interesting thing they told us. Most Park Pointers no doubt noticed all the helicopter activity over the Tall Ships when they were here in July. This was not Superior Helicopters. They were not operating over the harbor during the Maritime Festival. So who was it? I'm thinking Homeland Security might have been worried about "loose cannons" out there.

Editor's Corner

As our stretch of hot weather has sent crowds of people streaming to the beach, with the increased concerns about parties and sanitation issues, I have a couple of observations I'd like to make.

We live on 16^{th} Street, which is a public beach access – perhaps not an advertised one, but a marked one, well known to people on and off the Point. This always meant a lot of trash, both on the beach and in neighbors yards. The people who their trash back from the beach, finding no place to dispose of it, left it for us residents to deal with. As the city was unwilling to provide a trash can, we decided to put in one of our own. It's just a painted 55 gallon drum, with a lid, chained to a log along the path to the beach. And you know what? It worked. The amount of trash on the beach and in our yards has dropped dramatically. People see the can on their way to the beach, know there's a place to put their trash, and so are more willing to carry it back and dispose of it. People even seem more willing to pick up after their dogs, if they've got some place to dispose of the little bags of "doo" once they pick it up. My observation: People will do the right thing, providing you make it convenient for them to do so.

My second observation is related, but a little different. One of the jobs I've appointed myself to is gloving up and digging through that trash can, sorting out the recyclables, so I don't have to empty the whok can as often. This, of course, means picking out lots of empty beer cans and bottles. Now I remember beach parties when I was young. It usually meant buying large quantities of the cheapest beer available, and drinking it rapidly. The trash shows that there's still some of this going on. But more and more I'm finding empty bottles of different beers – call them micro-brews, craft beers, regional brews, whatever. These kinds of beers are a little different. First of all. they're more expensive, and usually sold in just 6 or even 4 packs. And they're meant to be drunk more slowly, sipped and enjoyed, rather than slammed in pursuit of inebriation. Yet, the people partying on the beach haven't changed much It's still the same young (hopefully) adults, college-age 20-somethings. So my observation concerns these young people: they're drinking better beer. And that has to be a positive sign for the future.
