Coming Soon: A Postcard from Park Point



Practicing my best “ambush journalism”, I accosted sign guru Dave Johnson as he was walking to his truck, asking, “So, when are you going to start on the new s-curve sign?” His ever so civil reply was “I’m going to kill the next person who asks me that!”

Digging deeper, however, Dave revealed that work has already begun on the project. Materials have been purchased, and parts are being built off-site, so that the actual erection of the sign is a simple assembly project – with a bit of hand shoveling and heavy lifting, of course.

Dave showed me what he called his “cocktail napkin designs” which are actually quite detailed plans for what he’s named “The Postcard”, a welcome sign that may well become a landmark in itself. That’s on the incoming, or “tourist” side of the sign, while the other side will be a much easier to use and read message board for us Park Pointers. Look for the new sign to appear soon. Or should I say “expect a postcard soon.”

September 15, 2011 Park Point Community Club

Minutes

The meeting was called to order by club president, Dick Gould at 7:05 pm. There were 22 people in attendance.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes as written in the Breeze.

Treasurer's Report

2011 beginning balance \$43,026

July 1, 2011 balance \$53,592

July income \$3,118

July expenses \$6,646

July 31, 2011 ending balance \$49,642

The meeting was suspended for **Speakers**.

Cindy Hakala and Austin Lesmeister came from the MN Department of Health, Infectious Disease Epidemiology Prevention & Control Division. They are responsible for the beach monitoring program and they described their work and answered questions. Park Point beaches are monitored twice a week. Lafayette beach has had only 1 bad test in the last 4 years. The two problem areas are behind Herding Island and near the Boat Club.

A Captain from the Fire Department discussed their concerns that many houses on Park Point do not have their address on the house where they can be easily seen from the road. This is especially difficult for Station 5 since there is only one person in the rig. They are urging all residents to check and make sure their address can be clearly seen from the street, this is a safety issue.

Pamela from the Parks and Rec Department introduced herself. She is the last Recreation Specialist in the City. She praised our use of Lafayette and our Club's involvement in the community. She is available to answer question and can be contacted at the Parks and Rec. building.

Communications

1. We received a letter from a pleased renter who praised Missy's care of Lafayette.
2. We received a letter from the American Red Cross who would like to use Lafayette as a part of the American Red Cross community response by allowing them to use our facility in the event of a large scale disaster for a shelter or service center. The Club felt this was a good use of our facility and will contact the Red Cross.
3. On August 23, 2011 we received a letter from the IRS informing us that upon

review of our application they determined that The Minnesota Point Preservation Society, Inc. is exempt from Federal income tax under section 501 (c) (3).

Committee Reports

Membership: 270 as of Sept. 15, 2011

Art Fair: Carla and Jake reported that this years Art Fair went well with artist and art goers very pleased. The days went smoothly due to all the great volunteers. They are already working on next year fair and are looking at possible grants to help defer some of the costs.

S-Curve: Second vote was taken to approve up to \$500 for the construction of the new sign. Dave Johnson hopes to begin working on the sign late September. Dennis Hoelscher made a motion to purchase about 45 sandstone bricks to be use at the curve for approximately \$200. The motion was seconded and discussion included how this would help with the planned gardens and enhance the look of the area. A vote was taken and passed.

Old Business

We did not received the Grant we applied for with the City to carpet the lower level of Lafayette.

New Business

Dave Lavamaki will not be able to work with the winter skating program because of further pending surgery on his foot. If anyone is interested in helping to maintain the skating rink this winter contact Dick Gould.

Now that we have achieved our 501 c 3 status we need a Board of Directors for the Minnesota Point Preservation Society, Inc. Several people have express interest and if you are interested contact Dick Gould.

Doug Aretz informed us that Ecumen Bay Shore Health Center was named one of the top places to work in MN. right behind Mayo Clinic. We should feel proud to have them as apart of our community.

A motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting at 8:30.

If your garden has provided you with more edibles than you can eat, please remember the Soup Kitchen at Damiano Center and the CHUM food shelf are always in need of fresh produce.

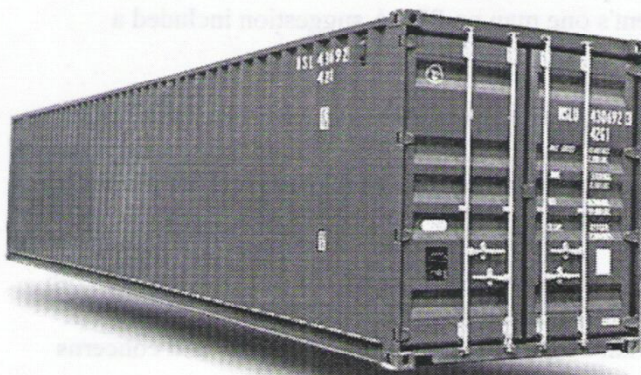
Upcoming Events:

Our wildlife is not only the source of fascination and admiration, on rare occasion a nuisance. They can also be funny and entertaining. The doe that comes to neighbor George's feeder gives me a hoot many evenings after dark when she works her tongue over the bird-size openings in the tube feeder to feast on the seeds. Now she brings her half-grown fawns. They are not tall enough to follow her example...still have the vestiges of fawn spots on their flanks.

The doe has a routine of getting what it can from the slits on either side of the mini-log cabin feeder. When waiting for more seeds to drop into the trays, she turns to the tube feeder and starts it swinging wildly when probing the tiny openings with her tongue folded lengthwise.

I'm mystified as one of her fawns wades alone just off shore, pausing frequently to watch for something on the darkened shore. I've seen this odd behavior on several nights recently.

Checking the shore in the late night hours (while answering the call nature imposes on men my age) I find that the night-fishing blue heron shows it isn't yet ready to migrate. It will stick around until ice forms, harassing the minnows as it silently moves with stealth in search of a snack.

The mallards replace the gangly fish-eater at dawn and take over the same stretch of shore. They are vegetarians and proceed on a stop-and-go routine while dipping their heads to grab an underwater morsel here and there. They also move quietly, the infrequent quacking done only by the hen. The drake must have nothing to say.

A few days ago the sun had just begun to lay its golden glow of morning on the land and the glossy bay water when one of our resident bald eagles loomed into view. The brilliant white head gleaming in the sun's rays, it was coming directly from the vicinity of the grain elevators while on course for Hearing Island. Seeing eagles here is no longer a sensation but the flight of this bird in such a lovely setting was exhilarating to follow.

It was moving without great haste just inches above the glassy surface. It flew within a few feet of a party of mallards then, finding none spooked by its imposing presence, gained altitude and perched in a dead birch to monitor the rest of the bay.

Those who feel we have many more resident gulls than we need (and may agree with those regarding these birds as "flying rats") will be heartened with a report from my neighbor, Chuck Sullivan, that he has watched eagles snatch a gull in flight over the Bay.

I hear a lot of stories about the five friendly foxes roaming the Point. Some claiming they have become so fearless they walk within an arm's length if tempted with food. Not a good idea to coax them so close...while our population appears to be healthy, foxes are known to be among the mammals that can become rabid. On returning one night recently to the basement garage in my apartment building, I found a half-dozen men searching among ten or more cars parked in their stalls.

They were trying to locate and evict a juvenile fox that apparently had followed behind a car after the driver opened the overhead door. I joined the "hunt" and saw it slip into a two car stall but it hid so well I was unable to scare it into making an exit. Realizing the animal was too frightened to move while we were in pursuit, we all left. Some minutes later it was seen trotting along the shore.
