It's an event that evolved from a neighborhood gathering 42 years ago into the region's premiere outdoor visual arts showcase. And it's coming to a sandbar near you. The 42nd annual Park Point Art Fair returns June 23-24 to the Park Point Recreation Area. Admission and parking is free at the nonprofit- coordinated event, which supports local ecological and civic initiatives. Featuring the juried fine art and craft of 115 premiere artists from the local area, upper Midwest and beyond, the Park Point Art Fair also offers live performances, music, food, children's activities and more—all in a stunning natural setting. An estimated 8,000-10,000 visitors have attended the annual weekend festival in recent years. Artists display and sell work in media such as clay, fiber, glass, painting, photography, jewelry, woodwork and sculpture. And while visual art is the showcase, there's more to experience during the fair, where you can stroll a pine-lined path tucked between Lake Superior and the Superior Bay:

• Live performance area, featuring music by award-winning performer Michael Monroe 10am-2pm Sat. & 11am-4pm Sun.

• Performance by Bold Choice Theater 2:30 on Saturday.





Park Point Community Club Minutes May 17, 2012

May, 2012 Park Point Community Club monthly meeting was called to order at 7:00pm by club president Dick Gould. There were 76 in attendance for the meeting.

April, 2012 Minutes

A motion was made by Don Freimuth to accept the minutes as they appeared in the Breeze. Tom Griggs seconded the motion.

Treasurer's Report

Beginning balance 4/1/2012	\$25,991	
Income	\$26,040	(Income from Art Fair, Community Club rentals)
Expenses	\$ 4,354	
Ending balance 4/30/2012	\$50,452	

Tom Rauschenfels made a motion to accept the treasurer's report.

Dave Johnson seconded the motion.

Fire Station #5 Closure

John Strongitharm, Fire Chief, spoke to the Community Club about the city's decision to close the firehall. The department needed to find an efficient way to run the fire dept. An outside firm was hired to collect run data for the last 10 years and then assess whether the Duluth Fire Dept. met the standards of the NFPA 1710. This is a standard for the 'Organization and Deployment of fire suppression operations, emergency medical operations, and special operations of career fire depts.'

A major concern of the Park Point residents have been the impact of the lifted bridge in the event of an emergency. John Strongitharm gave 'Bridge Facts - 2011'.

- 1. 1459 full lifts for Lake or Ocean Boats
- 2. Full lifts can be done in 10 minutes
- 3. Assuming every lift takes 10 minutes the bridge is down 97.22%
- 4. 1/2 of the lifts are outbound. Most can be slowed or stopped in an emergency
- 5. In 2011, the bridge delayed one response (was not an emergency call)
- 6. The busiest month had an average of six full lifts a day

From July, 2010 to June 2011, there were a total of 8712.8 hours. 47.2 hours were spent on fire dept. calls. 88 calls were non urgent, 2 dumpster or car fires, 2 vehicle accidents and 23 emergency medical calls. Less than 1% of calls were affected by the bridge.

John Strongitharm said revamping the city fire dept. would be carried out in three phases.

- Phase 1 Close Station #5, remove the unit from the Point and reassign staff
 - Phase 2 Redistrict city to prepare for changes in staff
 - Phase 3 Budget process to reduce overtime cost, decide on whether it is feasible to build a new UMD station, combine new station and Woodland station, and increase staffing at the Lakeside station.

According to the fire chief - On completion of Phase 3, the fire dept. will be NFPA 1710 staffing and Osha compliant.

Suggestions were given for consideration about staffing the Point on high traffic days such as the garage sale, art fair, Grandmas, Blues Festival & etc. Also, the fire chief was asked about considering an EMT office on the Point to care for medical emergencies.

New Business

Mike Fowler, Congdon hockey board member, spoke to the group about Congdon Hockey League using Lafayette ice rinks for possibly two seasons. Congdon rinks are unavailable to the league due to the remodeling of Congdon School. Mike said the rinks were adequate for what they need to use during the season. Congdon would provide boards, the basketball court would be flooded for pleasure use skating. Their association would provide the equipment and maintain the rinks.

Flooding of the rinks occur at night between 9:00 and 11:00pm.

The hockey rinks would be used Monday through Thursday from 5:00 - 8:00 pm. There would be occasional weekend games for Mites only. Anytime Congdon was not scheduled to use the rink, there would be open public skating. The flooded basketball rink would be open for public use at all times.

Congdon has one fundraiser planned, which would involve one weekend in the winter. Liability would be provided by Congdon Hockey Association for their events.

Auditing Committee

The by-laws of the club require an audit of the treasurer's books on a yearly basis. This year, the audit committee members were Pam Griggs, David Poulin and Heidi Harrison. The committee completed their audit and said the treasurer's books were in good order.

Membership

Liz Mackay reported 324 members have now signed up for the Park Point Community Club.

Garage Sale

Ready to take place. Per Charlene Shimmin, a food vendor would like to set up a trailer in someone's yard. The vendor is willing to pay the property owner if they allow the use of their land for the sale.

Art Fair update

Jake Kapsner brought bookmarks and postcards to the meeting. He is asking for volunteers to distribute posters. They are also looking for volunteers to help during the Art Fair.

Election of Officers

A list of officers was presented by the election committee. They were as follows:

Tom Ward made a motion to accept the list of officers. Tom Rauschenfels seconded the motion. Meeting ended at 9:20pm. A motion was made by Don Friemuth to adjourn the meeting. Dave Johnson seconded the motion.

Change at St. Andrew's by the Lake

After 23 years, Cindy Peterson Wlosinski retired as Vicar of St. Andrew's by the Lake. A process is now underway to find a new Vicar. This process begins with work by a Discovery Team that looks into the church's past and assesses the future needs of the church. The Discovery Team is in the first stages of working on the agenda. An Interim Vicar, Fr. Theo Park, has been hired to serve as minister during the transition. It is expected that the Discovery Team's work and the actual search for a new Vicar will last about one year or longer.

St. Andrew's continues to be an active participant on Park Point. Youth sell brats and burgers during the Park Point Garage Sale raising money for youth activities. Youth are also part of the Park Point Art Fair where they have a popcorn concession. Membership at St. Andrew's consists for Park Pointers, both long timers and recent residents, as well as members from the Duluth and surrounding communities. There are about 150 total active members. The church building, renovated in 2008-9, is designated as a "green" building and is the only active church currently on Park Point.

Park Point.....Naturally!

The morning of May 17 at 6:00 AM was not, in terms of major news in the media, anything auspicious. But for me it was one of the rare fleeting moments of life when a trivial happening reminded me that it's well worth it to take time to smell the roses...to allow one's self to see and enjoy something that could be easily dismissed as too mundane to rate a second glance or thought.

As is my routine habit on getting out of bed, the first thing I did was to look down on the bay from my third floor window to check for wildlife. The sky was partly cloudy, the temp 47 the wind absent and the bay free of ripples...the classic scene of serenity.

Literally a stone's throw below my window a miniature piece of the natural world of the kind that generates that a warm and fuzzy feeling we males may deny exists in our souls. The first of the Park Point goslings had arrived! There were just three of them...so little it was likely they were not yet a day old and their every move closely monitored by attentive parents.

In watching them follow their ingrained instincts as they zipped around the rocks of the irregular shore searching for their first meal while exploring every nook and cranny, it was hard to escape the urge to describe their antics in words reflecting human behavior. I could not help thinking of them as being akin to a spring-wound toy duckling in a child's bath tub, albeit one that never needs rewinding.

I know it would be foolish to ascribe intelligence, rather than instinct, as the source of their ability to immediately adapt to their environment after just hours of life. Who among us would not want to hold one in our hand and pet it while talking to it as we would a human baby?

Surely our Park Point fox population would dismiss my admiration of these little fuzz balls as absurd and would eye them only as a tender tidbit they would love to eat...if only they could snatch them away from the ever present, fiercely protective parents.

Some new but "just passing through" birds: In the regular daybreak parade of perhaps fifty Canada geese on May 20 the almost straight line of black and gray Canadas was punctuated by a petite, nearly pure white interloper---a Ross's goose. Only 23 inches long, compared to the 40 inch length of a Canada goose, it hasn't reappeared and, by now, is probably on nesting grounds in the Arctic. On Friday, May 25, a Twin Cities couple told me they trained their scope on a pair of whimbrels on Hearding Island's north shore...another of the birds that will summer in the Arctic along with the red throated loons seen again this spring far out from shore on the lake side of the Point.

(Speaking of Hearding Island, as I so often do, I hope that the man who walks his dog around the island will hold off repeating that hike until winter when there are no nesting birds to disturb.)

Two groups of white pelicans dropped by in mid-May on their way to points unknown. As usual, they stayed around for less than a full day and, as near as I could tell, did no fishing to refuel...just rested their flight muscles, did a lot of wing stretching exercises as they stood in just an inch or two of water off the west end of Hearding Island....just long enough for Lyle Anderson to attach his longest lens to get their portrait for the Breeze.

As Chief Strongitharm laid out the numbers, he showed that less than 1% of the calls to Park Point over the years have been affected by bridge lifts. This is one situation in which we can all HOPE we're part of the 99% !

There has been some effort at compromise, such as stationing an EMT or Public Safety Officer on Park Point. That would cut the odds of a "Bridging Tragedy" even more. But there was a real sense of security in knowing that, no matter what the emergency, or what the time, with just a call "our guy" from Fire Hall #5 could be there in a matter of minutes. And that security, sadly, will be lost.

But I'm not going to spend any more time whining – or sitting at this computer. It's a beautiful sunny day – almost beach weather. I've already had my feet in the water this morning – and I'm thinking about going for more!
