Duluth Boat Club President Bob Oulette presented plans for a water sports center near the boat landing at the Park Point Recreation Area to the Community Club at the September Meeting. The Duluth Boat Club is an umbrella organization including a number of Duluth water sports clubs. One member, the Duluth superior Sailing Association, currently operates from the site, working from boat racks and a few dock boxes – and has suffered a few vandalism losses. The proposed new building would allow for indoor classes and more secure boat storage. Other changes would include a partial breakwall and a dredged channel to provide better access for boats. At this point things are still in the planning stage. And as this is public land – and water – there are quite a few hoops to jump through.





Park Point Community Club Meeting

Thursday, September 20, 2012

Social began @ 6:30 pm with beach glass collections available to see. Regular meeting was called to order @ 7:00pm by PPCC president, Dawn Buck.

The civility checklist was read. A motion was made and seconded to suspend the rules for the regularly scheduled meeting to allow City of Duluth employees to update us about the new communication tower that will be built.. The existing tower that sits behind the fire station is in need of being replaced. The site of the new tower will be 80' north of the existing tower. Tari Rayala, City Architect, explained the reason for this site being most crucial . Jared DeMaster also spoke about the plans to build the new tower. Project should be completed Spring, 2013. Tari also spoke about grant money being approved for the bathroom, with an outside entrance, that will be attached to Lafayette building. The first 'Best of the Beach' glass competition was held, judged and trophies given. It provided an opportunity for those collectors to show their glass pieces they have found along the beach on Lake Superior. Congratulations to those persons who won the different categories.

Duluth Boat Club president, Bob Oulette spoke about their continuing plans to erect a building at the end of the Point close to the boat launch area. Mike Sawinski and Bob Oulette showed, in part, the proposed site for the building. Twelve years ago, the Duluth Boat Club reorganized. Their goal was to build a water sports center to involve more children, adults and families to Lake Superior water sports. The building they are proposing would be used in the summer for classes and in the winter for boat storage.

Jane Peterson from the Sons of Norway spoke about the Gingerbread City project. Jane said the Sons of Norway needed 1500 gingerbread houses to make up the city. The buildings should be built based on all walks of life, including businesses, schools, and regular homes. She said the display would be open starting with the Christmas City of the North parade at the Sons of Norway meeting hall on Lake Ave. and the display would be open to the public. Gingerbread baking classes will be offered. The City should not be built only of houses. She threw out ideas about a Park Point group offering to construct part of the Gingerbread City with water, aerial lift bridge & etc. Display pieces would be built out of gingerbread pieces and not graham crackers & etc.

Bryan Madson, Sky Harbor Airport manager introduced himself at the meeting.

`A motion was made and seconded to accept the minutes 8/15/2012 meeting as they appeared in the Breeze. Members vote resulted in all ayes. Passed.

Communication from fire chief, J Strogitharm, said the Park Point fire station would be torn down and the

property sold. The service the city provided during the end of summer with a truck and two firefighters ended Labor Day. The possibility of this happening next summer will be revisted next year.

County Land sale date for foreclosed land will be discussed at an informational meeting on Wednesday, October 3rd at 6:30 pm with Frank Jewell, as speaker.

PARK POINT ...

..NATURALLY

Spectacular! That's how I'd rate the great shot Lyle Anderson took last month. On the lake side of the Point near the bathhouse, with the multiple telephoto attachments, he was able to keep a steady hand despite the weight and size of his camera.



He estimated the migrant pelican flock to number about forty, more than twice as many as I have ever seen on Lake Superior and he caught them as they formed a tight knit group fishing line. In this formation they create a kind of net with their feet to force small fish into the shallows. They will also take amphibians and crustaceans

These birds may have spent the summer in western Canadian bogs and marshes and will keep going south until they reach the gulf coast They are an odd creature in several ways including the method both parents use to incubate their eggs; they hold them on top of or under their feet! During that time an increase of blood flows into the feet to keep them warmer than in non-breeding times.

Researchers still don't know why the adults sometimes drag the chicks around by the neck prior to feeding them. Two eggs are usually laid but only one chick will survive. The first born hogs the food brought by the adult and may dump the smaller nestling out of the nest to make sure it doesn't survive. I have never found any reports of pelicans nesting on Lake Superior. As noted in the July issue of the Breeze, the first record of a brown pelican in Minnesota followed reports of a single adult seen in the Mississippi River near Red Wing.

Watch for a gray-headed gull. We have a wide variety of gulls on the Point and most of us find it difficult to tell which species is which because of the similarity of color. There's one, however, that has been seen lately on Minnesota and Wisconsin Points and is easy to identify. Sabine's gull has a very dark gray head and a black bill with a yellow tip. It's truly a bird of the Arctic and winters in the southern hemisphere. Other Arctic migrants seen here at the end of September include the golden and black bellied plovers and sanderlings.

The juncos are back from a northern summer and many will stay around at least until late fall...a few may have been around all summer. They are regulars at feeders, usually feeding on the ground. They have a novel way of distracting predators about to pounce on them. They rapidly spread their dark tail feathers to display pure white ones. They have a cheery song, often referred to as a trill, but it's expressed in a single pitch. These birds tend to move about in flocks.

Parasitic jaegers are down again from the Canadian Arctic. As noted in past issues of the Breeze, this is the fast-flying marauder that sneaks up on local gulls that have picked up some food and will be forced to drop it when a jaeger (pronounced yeager) rams it while in flight!

They are uncommon here and this fact brings bird watchers to Minnesota and Wisconsin Point. I have seen them on the wing chasing gulls over the Bay. Just once did I watch one in hot pursuit of a ringbilled gull but it didn't get close enough to ram it and grab its lunch. I don't believe you could identify a jaeger based on my description---better to get a bird book. Living where you do it's certain you will find it very useful.

News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden

On Monday, September 17, our monthly potluck supper was well attended by about 30 people. Not only did we enjoy a delicious meal, but we also learned about caring for strawberries and raspberries from Peggy Dahlberg, the recently-retired UMD grounds supervisor. Thanks to Janine Bjerklie, we have notes on what we learned:

1. For raspberry plants, each fall remove the old or diseased canes, leaving 4 or 5 strong healthy canes on each plant. Cut the canes down to 4 to 5 feet high. Weed the beds, lay down cardboard around the plants, then a layer of straw mulch. Wet down the beds thoroughly.

2. For strawberry plants, thin out the plants so there are only 4 or 5 runners off of each main plant. Healthy runners removed from the garden are easily transplanted. Once the main plants are three years old, remove them. After one or two frosts, mulch strawberry plants with straw or pine needles.

3. Test your soil in the fall so you can confidently amend your soil before winter. The form for the extension service is found at www.stlouiscountymn.gov. Cost is \$15.

4. Maintain good hygiene in the garden by bagging and discarding diseased plants – don't compost them. It's also not a good idea to compost tomato or potato plants, as they can spread blights within composts that don't reach high enough temperatures.

Leaves Wanted:

Save your falling leaves and bring them to the community garden for composting.

What do flower gardeners do in the winter?

Besides thinking about whether their perennials will make it through the winter and catching up with ignored inside chores, some gardeners enjoy feeding the birds. Homemade suet is an idea. Melt 1 c. lard (or suet - beef fat) and 1 c. peanut butter together on low, take off heat and add 2 c. quick oats, 2 c. yellow commeal, 1 c. flour and 1/3 c. sugar. Spread on a cookie sheet and allow it to cool in the refrigerator until the mixture is just

hard enough to cut into pieces. Store in small freezer bags and use as needed. Park Point Garden Club invites you to join us for our October 25th meeting. Please call 727-2158, Pam Griggs, president.


