


Environmental Committee:

News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden

The asparagus must have seen their shadows as they poked their weary head from the ground in early May, giving us a few more weeks of wintry weather. But now, can it be, that we have fresh garden dirt under our nails, grass stained toes, and seeds in the ground? Yes, at last! In fact the edible garden folks have been busy the past several weeks. We have planned and purchased plants for the season, have created new garden beds, have turned the soil in the beds, and will likely have all our plants in the ground as you are reading this! We also have a new beautiful sign made from local tamarack that will last for years to come, thanks to Jim Ouray for his craftsmanship, and to Shirley Reierson for her artistic designs. If you haven't had a chance to see it in person, we have included a picture of it in this article.

We are experimenting with a new type of growing medium in our garden this summer – straw!! Denny Johnson has created a straw bale garden that will be home to potatoes and squash this summer. The concept was presented by Joel Karsten at a local workshop, but can also be accessed on the website: <u>http://strawbalegardens.com/</u>. In our garden, the bales are aligned tightly, in a straight row, and then held in place with stakes at either end. A string will be tied between the two stakes to create a vining opportunity for the squash. The bales were first conditioned with water and fertilizer, and now will serve as a growing medium for plants. Come down to the garden and check it out as it progresses. Denny will also be sharing straw bale gardening with the youth program this summer.

If you have managed to scrounge the closets and cupboards for culinary and garden supplies that need a new home, please consider donating the items to our park point rummage sale garden fundraiser! The sale will be held at LeAne and Bruce Rutherford's home, and items can be dropped off on June 7th at 3205 Minnesota Avenue. Please pre-price your items. Or, perhaps you are in need of some new and interesting finds and want to shop the fun during the Park Point Rummage Sales!

Our next community garden potluck with be held on Monday, June 17th at 6pm. Park Pointer and garden member, Lora Wedge, will provide a special garden blessing in honor of summer solstice. Our speaker for the evening will be Tom Uecker, a monarch butterfly enthusiast. He has studied and raised monarch butterflies most of his life and has visited the monarch sanctuaries in Mexico. He will tell us about the life cycle and development of the monarch butterfly and how to help these beautiful creatures by creating favorable habitats. Celebrate the beginning of summer and the beautiful monarch butterfly with us!



Though her wing had not returned to normal, she did get back in the water, leaving me to hope she was able to make it to Hearding Island and was not in the belly of one of our hungry foxes! (I saw three of them racing along the shore a few days ago)

Our crazy spring weather threw many things off schedule, including the normal time of bird migration. As most Pointers discovered during the foggy days just before the Memorial weekend, the little feathered ones apparently decided they couldn't delay their arrival any longer. I, and fellow residents of my apartment building at 19th, were a bit pleasantly startled to see tiny warblers inspecting their balconies. It had been an exhausting flight from central or South America.

Every few minutes a warbler landed on the deck, scurried around the pots of dried herbs, and then flew to the ceiling seeking a spider or any other thing edible. It was especially rewarding to see, among the somewhat drab female vireos and sparrows, a male American Redstart dressed for spring in orange and black. It had likely basked in the semi-tropical forest of Cuba all winter. Park Point has, indeed, been living up to its reputation as one of the very best locations in the state for bird watching...and, of course, for a lot of other good things that keep us so contented living here...

Good news: Yesterday, May 29, I was glad and surprised to her back on the lawn, wing still askew but not quite as much. There was no sign of her mate, however.

Water Safety

With summer comes a lot of use of our Lake Superior and its bays. Sailing, kayaking, rowing, fishing, swimming, etc. In the name of safety I would like to make sure we all talk the same language as our emergency responders. Lake Superior is on one side of our island and Superior Bay is on the other or harbor side. Between the Blatnik and Bong Bridges lies St. Louis Bay. In my many years living down here and running boats in our area I have seen many times where people don't know the different areas of the harbor and emergency crews get sent to the wrong place because of misinformation. The Duluth News Tribune does a very good job of getting things correct, but not so with our local TV stations, who often call the body of water west of the Point, Lake Superior Bay which just adds to the confusion for Duluthians. I go by the NOAA Harbor Chart and Corps of Engineers books and so do the Coast Guard and all other emergency responders. Please learn the correct names and use them. Thank you and have a

safe summer.
