Hi Neighbors,

Here is the scoop on our "non-recreation lane" after our discussion at our last meeting. Thank you to Officer Lindberg for this info; looks like there are some opportunities for citizen input to have a recreation lane.

"First off, the northbound shoulder, or lakeside shoulder is NOT an actual designated bike or recreation lane. I checked with our city engineer in regards to this, as I have been told by a few residents that they believe it IS a bike lane. Our engineer informed me that its current design is as a road shoulder. The short answer here is that bicycles and rollerbladers should be travelling the SAME DIRECTION as traffic, never against traffic. Walkers should always walk AGAINST traffic.

In order for it to be designated as a bike lane, there are a number of steps that would need to take place. These include:


-Signs and markings designating it

-If it is to be a two lane bike lane, there would need to be a physical divider between the bike lane and vehicle lane (prevent vehicles from crossing into it)

The good news here is that our city is trying to become more "bicycle friendly". As of now, there is no intent to make it a recreational lane. BUT, I was told by our engineer if there is a person/group that would like to take on a project to present to the City in regards to making a bicycle/recreation lane on that part of the street, they are more than open to ideas."

The July, 2013 Park Point Community Club meeting was called to order by club president, Dawn Buck.

He received this assignment in June, 2013. Craig said they are using ATVs for beach patrol. There have been numerous cases of smoking on the beach, alcohol use, fires & etc. Craig said users of the beach need to observe rules. A question was also asked about why on a particular occasion there were Duluth City Police, Border Patrol, and a State Highway Patrol. Craig said this was not unusual because of the uniqueness of Duluth having City of Duluth needs, State needs and because of the federally funded nature of the waterways, multiple units from different agencies could have an interest in the situation.

wonderful woman. Consider attending one of our meetings on any fourth Wednesday. Contact President Diane Gould, 727-4067, for meeting location.




News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden

The wind took away those beautiful sailing ship replicas from an era none of us experienced, but left us with deep impressions of what our waterfront life was like in a much younger, simpler Duluth. We can all cite the time and place where viewing was best. Luckily, I was just off the south side of the canal on the Let's Go Fishing group's classy new pontoon boat at the moment the first ship entered the port. Exciting as that was, it was exceeded in a most unlikely viewing spot---stalled in a line of vehicle traffic on the south side of the bridge! It was the only time I was actually pleased to be stopped there. It was 7:30 and the sun had dipped low. Using "That lane you can't park in during the Summer"

You know the one I mean. The lake side of Lake Avenue South, changing to Minnesota Avenue at the s curve. People refer to it as the bike lane, or the recreation lane, but it doesn't meet the legal requirements of either one, and hasn't for years. Still, it continues to be posted "No Parking from May 1 through October 31st". It gets used for walking, running, biking, rollerblading, roller skiing, skateboarding, scootering (is that a word?) and probably a few things that I haven't thought of. Yet, it's not "legal" for any of those uses, and police and safety officials will go into great detail explaining why it is unsafe to use as it is.

Unlike last summer, we have had no emergency responders stationed on the Point. And that puts us all at risk. It could have been a tragedy. The pilot - and the City – got lucky this time.

Thank You volunteers

A big thank you to all the volunteers for the work they put into the 43rd annual Park Point Art Fair. The weather was beautiful, the crowds were large and the response was unanimous, the Park Point Art Fair was a huge success. The artists commented positively on everything from the high quality of the work represented to the hospitality of the community. Our best of show was awarded to Patrick Dragon whose highly skilled thrown and altered ceramic pieces were outstanding. We collected 167 email addresses from our audience and estimated a crowd of somewhere between 8 and 9 thousand. Our profit is estimated at \$8,000. And we could not have done it without all of you, sitting for the artists, helping kids make art and most importantly shopping for art. It is our goal to keep up the quality of the art while drawing artists from the Mid-west. All who joined us this year are professionals who show at fairs all around the country and even though the majority have MN, WI and MI addresses they are on the road a good part of the year. Our news coverage was great this year with three TV stations coming out to interview me and the audience, KUMD's week long interviewing of artists who joined us and the DNT article.
