
Notes from January's meeting:

Garage Sale Goodies Wanted



Park Point.....Naturally

To say that this winter has been a "rough one" is an understatement and you need no reminder that it isn't over yet. Once again, I've been trying to figure out how the original settlers on the Point, the Native Americans, survived such extreme conditions. Most of us have a pantry full of food to last an extra week or so. It's hard for me to imagine how an Ojibwa family—say a half dozen---could cram a whole winter's-worth of groceries into even the largest tepee!



We know that, eventually, we can replenish our food shelves at the grocery store but, with harbor ice three feet thick, it would be nearly impossible to open a fishing or spearing hole with primitive tools. Except for goldeneyes (which we often see swimming in the canal) the waterfowl would have disappeared before the freeze up.

Bears and small mammals go underground. After the snow depth reaches 21 inches, the deer have no space beneath their bellies to move about. A hunter would find them to be very scarce. Until white settlers blocked their migration routes, local deer retreated well to the south in the fall. (According to National Geographic magazine)

There was one food source that could have been the key to their survival. Very recent research revealed that wild rice once grew in the harbor. It isn't known how abundant it might have been, however.

We like to pride ourselves as being hardy folk able to handle whatever Mother Nature imposes on us. I don't know about you, but at age 83, I know I wouldn't be around to enjoy spring after wintering on the Point in a tepee.

As for wildlife.....Judging from the number of reports I've been getting, we're well attended by coyotes. I have heard of scattered sightings of them singly or paired. Neighbor Audrey Monicken called me excitedly one morning in mid-January to report watching four coyotes coming from the west across the bay. The odd thing she noted was that they were spaced at nearly precise distances from each other and ambling along in a straight line as they headed for Hearding Island.

My logbook entry for January 12 registers the following: 9:15 am. Fox walks out to yellow marker buoy about 100 yards off shore at 19th, sniffs all round it for signs others have also checked it out. It almost certainly was a male on the prowl, leaving his personal scent mark, a ritual now that the fox and coyote mating season is underway.

Dear Neighbors,

Andrew Slade from the Minnesota Environmental Partnership has agreed to talk about the proposed Keystone Oil Terminal in Superior at our February 20th Park Point Community Club meeting. Below is a summary of the proposal. Be sure to attend this informative meeting to learn more about this important development in the St Louis Bay.

Overview of Proposed Oil Transfer Terminal in Superior

Prepared by Andrew Slade, Minnesota Environmental Partnership

Proposed Calumet oil transfer terminal in Superior would:

- Cost \$25 million to \$30 million.
- Be located at the former Georgia Pacific site
- Take oil from existing Enbridge pipelines. Calumet would then move the oil into its own short pipeline system from the refinery area to a new waterfront facility at the former Georgia Pacific Plant. Calumet already has a lease agreement with Elkhorn Industries, which owns the site.

Rationales

- The transfer from pipeline to water-based transportation makes sense because Enbridge can bring 500,000 more barrels a day into Superior than it can send out.
- Calumet wouldn't refine any of the oil transferred onto boats; it can make enough money simply transferring crude from pipeline to boats.
- Would use small but viable pipeline from the refinery that runs north along Hill Avenue to the waterfront. The 6-inch, 1950s-vintage pipe needs some repairs but is still in good shape and is permitted to move oil. Calumet would need permission to extend that line 1,500 feet to the Elkhorn docking site, where Calumet would build two 150,000-barrel storage tanks to hold oil to be loaded onto tankers or barges.
- Shipping by Great Lakes vessel is about one-third the cost of moving oil by rail car about \$3.50 a barrel compared to \$9 a barrel for rail, according to Calumet's estimates.
- Employ five to 15 people during the open-water shipping season.
- Load about one tanker or barge every four days. Each tanker holds about 77,000 barrels (3.2 million gallons) of crude oil; each barge about 110,000 barrels (4.6 million gallons).
- Open as early as March 2015 when that year's shipping season begins.
- Be considered a short-term project about five to 10 years until U.S. crude oil pipeline capacity increases.
- Not be a new idea: Oil and gas have moved on the Great Lakes since at least the 1880s, as recently as 1992 in Superior, and currently are a major cargo in and out of other ports on the lakes.
- Need several permits for dredging, pier repairs, storage tanks and vapor emissions.
- Still need a customer. Calumet won't build until it has one or more refineries, likely on the lower Great Lakes or East Coast, committed to buy the oil from North Dakota. Source: Duluth News Tribune (MN) Sunday, February 24, 2013

Emergency response capabilities

- Calumet would be required to have a fast-response oil cleanup contractor on call to be at the scene within 24 hours, according to Coast Guard
- Coast Guard station also has 2,000 feet of oil boom to contain spills. And the Coast Guard Cutter Alder stationed in the Duluth harbor has the ability to deploy a boom that can vacuum oil off the surface of the harbor.
- (BUT TAR SAND OIL SINKS....)



Letter to the Editor

Dear Park Point Neighbors:

The letter to the Editor in the Jan. 2014 Breeze reminded me of two sayings of the wise women in my life: "Let sleeping dogs lie." and "Be careful what you ask for." These wise women raised their families enjoying the freedom of movement and travel to the Lake to swim in summer, and to the frozen Bay to skate and iceboat in winter. The pathways to the water have been used by residents since the first settlers platted the parcels and streets, and named them for adoption by the elected city representatives to be part of City of Duluth in the 1800s. Today, we all use the street ends for many more recreational activities.

Whether you realized it or not, when you purchased your property on the Point, you purchased the rights of passage and travel to and from your property using these very same pathways that are platted surrounding each and every block. So, "be careful what you ask for" when it comes to making changes in the platted streets, because all Park Point property owners in their plat have purchased the rights of passage and travel on the platted streets, whether or not there is pavement, gravel, or trees or gardens growing on these platted streets.

Several years ago, two neighbors blocked 40th Street, and caused the Minnesota Supreme Court to issue a ruling removing their fence. The Court stated: 'It is a well-established rule of law in Minnesota 'that one purchasing a lot within a plat may rely upon the dedication of streets and alleys shown therein, and possess the right to use the same.'" Indeed, 'each purchaser of a lot is entitles to the benefit of the plat as it appears when he purchases it. If there are public streets, they inure to his benefit.'" Blocking the rights to passage and travel of citizens who own property within their plat is not legal in Minnesota. Remember too, to "let sleeping dogs lie." We should follow this advice and join together to enjoy our piece of paradise including the rights of travel and passage on the platted streets surrounding our property. Changes that reduce free access to the Lake and Bay are not acceptable.
