# Twenty-five Years Already! Memories of the Great Halloween Blizzard

In 1991, Halloween was no treat for many residents in parts of Iowa and Minnesota. On the morning of October 31st, 1991, a storm began that would eventually become known as the "Great Halloween Blizzard" in Minnesota, and the "Halloween Ice Storm" in Iowa. By mid-morning on Halloween, a mixture of snow, sleet and freezing rain had blanketed southeastern Minnesota and much of Iowa.

As the mix continued to come down on November 1st, many areas in Iowa saw up to two inches of ice on top of 8 to 15 inches of snow. Winds of 30 to 40 m.p.h. downed trees and utility poles, leaving some 80,000 homes in the state without power and closing many highways. Utility damage alone came to nearly \$63 million.

In Minnesota, the 1991 storm is one of those weather events that makes people recall what they were doing as it unfolded. Still celebrating the Minnesota Twins' second World Series victory in just four years, most found it hard to imagine winter on the horizon. The high temperature in the Twin Cities was 65 degrees on the 29th, ten degrees above normal; the next day, the high reached only 32 degrees. Before it was over, as much as three inches of ice left at least 20,000 Minnesotans without power. With winds of up to 60 mph and snowdrifts over 10 feet, hundreds of motorists became stranded. More than 900 schools and businesses were closed on November 1st, and many roofs collapsed under the weight of the ice and snow. At least 20 people died in traffic accidents, or from heart attacks while digging out from the storm. Sadly, as Dave Johnson remembers, Park Point neighbor Bill Moore was among them. "Bill was a veteran," he recounts; "he served in the cavalry in North Africa during World War II. Neighbors told Bill, 'Don't worry...we'll dig you out!'" But Bill wasn't the sort of guy to acquiesce. "He literally died with his boots on," recalls Dave, "shrugging off all offers of assistance from his neighbors. He was out snow-blowing his driveway immediately following the storm...and just hours before his death."

Minneapolis and surrounding suburbs received as much as 42" of snow in two bursts over a 48-hr. period, although their "official" total of 28" reflected only the first half of the storm. Duluth's final totals ran to as much as 39 1/2 inches, although - as always - snowfall varied dramatically by neighborhood and according to how quickly the rain switched over to snow. That 39.5" Duluth total remained the highest ever recorded in the State of Minnesota for a single snow event until a 46-incher up in Finland surpassed it, less than three years later.

"I remember that my husband and I, seeing how bad it was getting, drove from our home in Bloomington to his sister's house in south Minneapolis as soon as we'd accommodated our tiny handful of trick-or-treaters. We hoped to be able walk to work the next morning. There were only ten blocks between her house and work, but it took us the better part of an hour to trudge on foot through snow up to our hips," said current Pointer Ellen Dunlap. "We didn't make the eight miles back home for over two days; it took that long to clear the roads. When we finally arrived at the end of our driveway, we almost cried! We faced a mountain of hard-packed snow and ice over ten feet tall, courtesy of the heavy equipment brought in by the National Guard. Nearly two more days before we'd cleared out and could finally pull our car in."

# **Blizzard Memories continued...**

Tom Mackay recalls that Park Point's "warmer by the Lake" effect spared our little island from the deepest snow. Neither he nor wife Liz had any idea there was a storm of such magnitude brewing, and they went off to work on November 1st ."I had all three of the Vista boats over in dry dock at Fraser Shipyards in Superior. When I got there, the gate guard said, 'Go home; we're closed for the storm!' I-35 and the Blatnik Bridge were still mostly snow free." Liz Mackay got to work, but found herself nearly alone. "We still didn't get anything compared to over the hill," added Tom.

Dave Poulin likewise noted that Pointers, while they had to deal with snow that was very heavy and wet, encountered totals less deep than in upland neighborhoods. Still, he recalled travel being difficult, as the limited number of snow plows prepared for action were all sent to higher ground. "The City hadn't anticipated a storm this early, and much of their snow removal equipment was disassembled for normal maintenance. (Both my) snow blower and the one at the Catholic church broke down and I needed parts. Roy Halverson Small Engine...was advertising on the radio that is was open for business, so I put on my blaze orange hunting coat so I could be seen in the snow, hopped on my mountain bike and headed for 10th Street. They were not open. On the way back home, photographer Tim Slattery saw me and decided I must have been very photogenic, so he took my picture and gave me a copy."

Scott Wolff remembers digging through 3-foot drifts a few days later in order to plant the tulip bulbs he still hadn't gotten around to in the warm autumn sun.

Ultimately, more than 23 million people in the states of Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Michigan were affected. The storm was ranked a #5 on NOAA's Regional Snowfall Index—their most extreme category. Let us all appreciate a snow-free October (and November?) in 2016!

What can we do about this problem?

- · Send products back to the manufacturer
- The 4R's:
  - Reuse keep and use the plastics you have
  - Recycle research what is really recyclable and purchase accordingly. There are many types of plastic; numbers 1-7 don't cover the spectrum

Reduce - shop carefully, buy fewer items, buy less

Refuse- choose not to accept that extra wrapping or bag with your purchases

Can we convert plastics back to petroleum? Japan is working on this.

Want to know more?

You might consider researching Dr. Rios and her studies. You will find out more about her love of teaching and the important work she is doing with her students to identify the serious effects of plastics and other chemicals in our "backyard," a.k.a. the Great Lakes and the World's oceans. Her studies are bringing about change in the industrial world.



# News from the Lafayette Community Edible Garden

At our October 16th potluck dinner, Dan Kislinger and Paul Treuer from the Duluth Community Garden Program talked about ways to preserve our harvest without refrigeration. They've had success with fermentation, canning and drying. The Duluth Community Garden Program has equipment you can borrow if you want to try any of these processes. Dan and Paul also recommended the following books that they use as guides:

- The Art of Fermentation, by Katz and Pollan
- Stocking Up, by Stoner
- Putting Food By, by Hertzberg and Greene

For our November 20th dinner, there will be a time change. Our gathering will start at 6 p.m. instead of our usual 5:00. Our speaker will be Kris Eilers, Executive Director of the St, Louis River Alliance. This Alliance is a member-based nonprofit that works to restore, protect and enhance the St. Louis River. The SLRA has worked on a project for the last six years, funded in part by the US Fish and Wildlife Services, to restore piping plover habitat and provide education and outreach to the community. At the November dinner, Kris will focus on the critically endangered shorebird, the piping plover, which historically has had nesting grounds on Park Point. The piping plover likes to nest out on the beach, and is therefore vulnerable to human activity, loose dogs and natural predators. Kris will give a brief overview of piping plovers and their habitat and address why, while they return to Park Point year after year, they haven't stayed to nest since the mid-1980s.

Park Point residents have been active as volunteers, and are important to the success of piping plover nesting habitat protection. Come hear about this rare shorebird and learn what you can do to help them find a safe place to nest. Kris will also have cute piping plover hats for sale in both adult and children's sizes.

# Wanted Dead Or Alive:

Yes, we are on the hunt for your leaves - dead or alive - to fill our compost bins in the community garden. Just bag up your raked-up leaves and drop them off inside the garden gate.

# Just for fun:

Our October question was, "What is a geoduck?" Answer: It is a large, edible saltwater clam found on the west coast of North America.

November's question: What part of the cinnamon tree produces the spice we call cinnamon? The answer will appear in the December issue of the Breeze.
