### Motions and Resolutions

By Commissioner Williams:

Whereas there has been a number of deaths through drownings occasioned by swimming, both minors and adults, on the lake shore side of Minnesota Point south of the Aerial Lift Bridge; and

Whereas it is deemed necessary and expedient in the interest of public safety that a municipal bathing beach be established on the lake shore side of Minnesota Point so as to eliminate as far as possible accidental drownings through unfamiliarity with the various water depths along the lake shore.

Now therefore be it resolved, that the City of Duluth does hereby designate and establish as a municipal bathing beach an area of beach to be determined by the Manager of the Park Department in Hartman Park between Interlaechen Street and Pelengar Street in Oatka Beach addition to Duluth:

Resolved Further that the Manager of the Park Department be and he is given complete supervision and control over the management and operation of such bathing beach;

Resolved further That the Manager of the Park Department is hereby authorized and directed to locate and establish necessary buoys and such other life saving devices as in his judgment is necessary and requisite for the reasonable safeguarding of life at such bathing beach and to that end is authorized to co-operate and seek the co-operation of various city civic organizations and clubs, including the Coast Guard and the United States Engineering Departments of the Federal Government located at Duluth;

Resolved Further, That the manager of the Park Department be and he is authorized to expend a sum not to exceed \$200.00 payable out of the General Fund as the city's share towards the cost of equipping and supervising such bathing beach.
